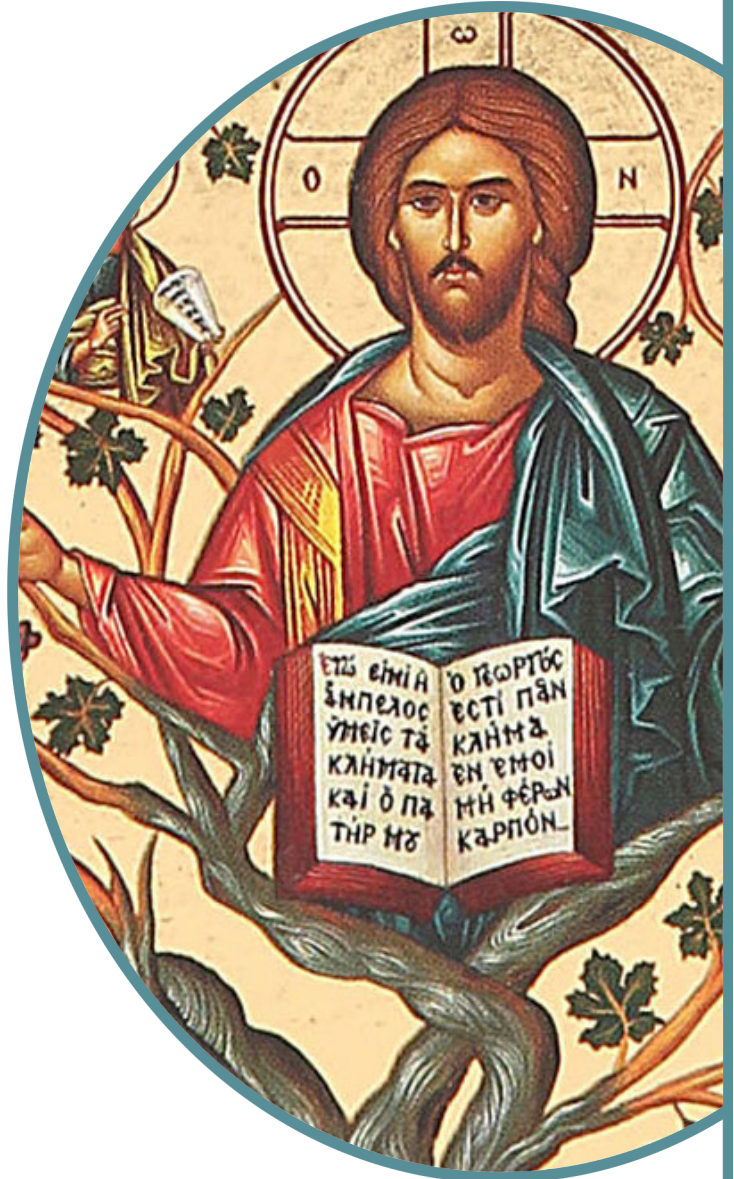

Dear Parishioners:

On September 9, speaking in a phone call with reporters on Thursday before the National Day of Prayer for Peace in Our Communities, Archbishop Wilton Gregory of Atlanta said. “when there is violence, there ought to be Catholic presence and prayer and action to raise up the frustration that drives the violence, whether it be lack of economic opportunity, jobs, education, all of those things that are really systemic examples of racism that need to be identified and confronted.” Archbishop Gregory chairs the U.S. bishops’ Task Force to Promote Peace in Our Communities. If it hopes to bring peace to racial tensions in the U.S., the Catholic Church must be more present in troubled communities and unite with other faiths in doing so, bishops insisted.

After several high-profile incidents of racial tension over the summer — fatal shootings of black men by police officers in Minneapolis and Baton Rouge, and shootings of five police officers in Dallas — Archbishop Joseph Kurtz called for the Task Force to Promote Peace in Our Communities. The purpose of the task force was to help bishops prepare for the day of prayer for peace, and to see how the Church could better address societal problems like racial tension, gun violence, and lack of economic opportunity.

In Our Parish, I urge my parishioners to help me create the task force committee. However, prayer is only the beginning of the solution, said Bishop Fabre, who chairs the bishops’ subcommittee for African-American affairs. In taking action to fight racism, Church leaders must do so in person in the communities where such racism exists. This team is really in the very beginning stage. I want everyone having a time and space to talk how racism manifests itself in society, and maybe even in our parish community. If you hear about it and want to join, please let me know.

Estimada Tía Tota:

UN 9 de septiembre, hablando en una llamada telefónica con reporteros el jueves antes del Día Nacional de Oración por la Paz en Nuestras Comunidades, el Arzobispo Wilton Gregory de Atlanta dijo que: “cuando hay violencia, debe haber presencia católica, oración y acción para despertar la frustración que impulsa la violencia, ya sea la falta de oportunidades económicas, trabajos, educación, todas esas cosas que son realmente ejemplos sistémicos de racismo que necesitan ser identificados y confrontados”. El arzobispo Gregory preside el Grupo de trabajo de los obispos de EE. UU. para promover la paz en nuestras comunidades. Dijo que si esperamos llevar la paz a las tensiones raciales en los EE. UU., la Iglesia católica debe estar más presente en las comunidades con problemas y unirse a otras religiones para hacerlo.

Después de varios incidentes de alto perfil de tensión racial: tiroteos racistas fatales por parte de agentes de policía en Minneapolis y Baton Rouge, y tiroteos de cinco agentes de policía en Dallas — el arzobispo Joseph Kurtz convocó al Grupo de trabajo para promover la paz en nuestras comunidades. El propósito del grupo de trabajo era ayudar a los obispos a prepararse para el día de oración por la paz. Pero también para ver cómo la Iglesia podría abordar problemas sociales tales como la tensión racial, la violencia armada y la falta de oportunidades económicas.

En Nuestra Parroquia, insto a mi feligreses a que me ayuden a crear el comité del grupo de trabajo. Empezaremos haciendo oración. Pero, como dijo el obispo Fabre (quien preside el subcomité de obispos para asuntos afroamericanos) la oración es solo el comienzo de la solución. Debemos tomar medidas para combatir el racismo, los líderes de la Iglesia deben hacerlo en persona en las comunidades donde existe dicho racismo. Este equipo está realmente en la etapa inicial. Quiero que todos tengan un tiempo y un espacio para hablar sobre cómo se manifiesta el racismo en la sociedad, y tal vez incluso en nuestra comunidad parroquial. Si escuchas al respecto y deseas unirte, por favor házmelo saber.
